I. DEPARTURES AND APPOINTMENTS

- Patricia Malone, the Executive Director of Stony Brook's Center for Corporate Education and the Advanced Energy Training Institute, has taken on temporary duties as the leader of the School of Professional Development (SPD). Pat's endeavors in corporate education have enabled our University to serve over 1000 professionals each academic year. She has stewarded clean energy, manufacturing, and aerospace labor market development projects for the New York State Department of Labor, the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority (NYSERDA), and the New York Regional Economic Development Councils Opportunity Agenda.
- Stony Brook University Hospital has appointed Mark Sands, MD, MBA, FACR, as Chief Medical Officer. Dr. Sands previously served as the Enterprise Associate Chief Quality Officer for the Cleveland Clinic Foundation, where he was responsible for standardizing high-risk quality clinical operations across ten Health System hospitals, fifteen Family Health Centers, and eight Ambulatory Surgery Centers. He is board certified in Diagnostic Radiology and served as Vice Chairman of Clinical Operations and Quality of the Cleveland Clinic's Enterprisewide Imaging Institute (Radiology). As Chief Medical Officer, he will oversee the clinical operation including quality of care and patient safety, coordination of clinical care, development of clinical information systems and physician engagement.

II. FRIEND OF STONY BROOK, CHARLES B. WANG, DIES AT 74

Charles B. Wang, 74, founder of CA Technologies, Stony Brook Foundation Trustee Emeritus, Honorary Degree recipient and steadfast supporter of Stony Brook University, died on Sunday, October 21 on Long Island surrounded by his family.

The Charles B. Wang Center at Stony Brook University opened in 2002 thanks to a \$52 million gift from Wang which was, at the time, the largest individual donation in SUNY history. The Center serves as a bridge between cultures and a welcome home to all students.

III. VICE PRESIDENT BRISBANE DONATES \$1M FOR CUSTODIAL STAFF SUPPORT

As part of a \$1 million planned gift to the University, former Dean of the School of Social Welfare and current **Vice President for Health Sciences Workforce Diversity, Dr. Frances Brisbane**, has announced that she is establishing the **Owens-Brisbane Wellbeing and Educational Advancement Endowment for Health Sciences Custodial Staff**. This brings her lifetime giving total to Stony Brook to over \$1.5 million. Recipients of her donations have ranged from Stony Brook Athletics to the School of Dental Medicine's Community Outreach Fund to the Staller Center for the Arts.

IV. NAMING OF THE RENAISSANCE SCHOOL OF MEDICINE AT STONY BROOK UNIVERSITY

The **Board of Trustees of the State University of New York** recently approved the naming of the **Renaissance School of Medicine at Stony Brook University**. This is in recognition of the 111 current and former employees of Renaissance Technologies and their families, who have donated more than \$500 million to date including \$165.5 million that directly benefits Stony Brook Medicine and its School of Medicine.

V. STONY BROOK RANKED FOURTH BEST COLLEGE FOR MARINE BIOLOGY BY COLLEGE MAGAZINE

College Magazine has ranked Stony Brook University fourth on its list of "The 10 Best Colleges for Marine Biology." Stony Brook is the only university in New York State and in the Northeast to make the top 10 list. Stony Brook's program in the School of Marine and Atmospheric Sciences (SoMAS) was noted for its hands-on field research and experience in and around the Shinnecock Bay, the Peconic River and the greater Atlantic Ocean through the Marine Sciences Center on the Stony Brook Southampton campus.

VI. FACULTY, STAFF, AND STUDENT ACCOLADES

The **Red Watch Band CARE Team** recently won the **Caron Foundation's Community Youth Leadership Award**. Red Watch Band is a bystander intervention program that teaches students how to prevent toxic drinking deaths.

Issa Balde, a Business Management major, was selected as a **Forbes Under 30** scholar and had the opportunity to attend the recent Forbes Under 30 Summit.

Ph.D Student **Bingjie Zhang** received the 14th annual **Mow Shiah Lin Scholarship**. The Asian Pacific American Association (APAA) at Brookhaven National Laboratory funds the scholarship in honor of the late Brookhaven Lab scientist for whom it is named.

Dr. Trevor Sears, a professor in the Chemistry Department was selected as a **2018 Fellow by the American Physical Society**. Professor Sears was selected based on his advances in the high-resolution spectroscopy of small molecular free radicals, particularly those of importance in combustion chemistry.

Dr. Marvin Goldfried, distinguished professor of Clinical Psychology in the Department of Psychology, recently received the **Gold Medal Award for Life Achievement** in the Application of Psychology from the American Psychological Foundation.

Paul Kelton was recently appointed to the inaugural **Robert David Lion Gardiner Endowed Chair in American History** at a ceremony held in the Charles B. Wang Center.

Professor Minh Hoai Nguyen and his team, in the **Department of Computer Science**, earned a **National Science Foundation award** worth nearly \$1.2 million, which will allow researchers in computer science and psychology to work together to research patterns in human eye movement in order for computational systems to anticipate responses to certain stimuli.

Jennifer Gersten, a DMA candidate in the Department of Music, received the **2018 Rubin Prize in Music Criticism**. The \$10,000 award is given by the Stephen and Cynthia Rubin Institute for Music Criticism at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music.

Ken A. Dill, distinguished professor in the Departments of Chemistry and Physics & Astronomy and the Louis and Beatrice Laufer Endowed Chair of Physical and Quantitative Biology, has been awarded the **American Physical Society's 2019 Max**

Delbrück Prize in Biological Physics for his independent contributions to a new view of protein folding.

The Fellows of the AMS designation recognizes members who have made outstanding contributions to the creation, exposition, advancement, communication, and utilization of mathematics.

Emily Snyder, Associate Director of the Office of Commuter Student Services and Off-Campus Living, received the **William C. Hine Distinguished Service Award** from the Alpha Sigma Lambda (ASL) National Honor Society in recognition of her work on behalf of non-traditional students.

Xiuxiong Chen, a professor in the Department of Mathematics, and Sir Simon Donaldson, a permanent member of the Simons Center for Geometry and Physics are two of three awardees of the American Mathematical Society 2019 Oswald Veblen Prize in Geometry. The Veblen Prize is awarded every three years for outstanding research work in geometry or topology.

Danny Bluestein, Professor of Biomedical Engineering in the College of Engineering and Applied Sciences has been awarded a **\$3.84 million Bioengineering Research Partnership U01 grant** from the National Institute of Biomedical Imaging and Bioengineering for his proposal "Biomechanical Approaches and Technologies for Enhancing TAVR Outcomes."

VII. RECENT EVENTS

Supreme Court Associate Justice Sonia Sotomayor spoke at Stony Brook's First Year Reading Program culmination event. In a fireside chat with President Stanley, her inspirational words encouraged students to build community and to strive to overcome obstacles to success.

Thousands of University faculty, staff and administrators attended a Cultural Competency Seminar at the IFCU Arena on Tuesday, October 9. This first-of-its-kind campuswide training covered recognizing and responding to implicit bias, bullying and sexual misconduct.

Prince Emmanuel de Merode, noted conservationist and director of the Virunga National Park in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, was awarded an **Honorary Degree Doctor of Humane Letters** for his selfless and heroic devotion to saving African wildlife and for supporting the rangers who protect them. As part of the Presidential Lecture series, he also screened and discussed the Oscar-nominated documentary *Virunga*, which depicts efforts to protect the park from poachers, armed militia and other threats.

IX. ADVANCEMENT UPDATE

Since the beginning of the fiscal year on July 1, we have secured a total of \$14.1 million from 5,002 donors. The following are the most recent examples of how our generous donors are investing in our students, faculty, and patients through their giving:

- \$600,000 to complete an Endowed Professorship in Global Citizenship in the College of Arts and Sciences
- \$500,000 for the Pediatric Emergency Department Expansion Fund

- \$450,000 for Staller Center, academic and athletic scholarships
- \$125,000 for the Digital Humanities Project at University Libraries
- \$100,000 for a graduate assistantship in the College of Business

President Stanley and Dr. Ellen Li have agreed to match the senior class gift this year with a goal of increasing both the number of students participating in the senior class gift and the impact of the gift on the university.

X. ATHLETICS UPDATE

Men's Basketball is 6-1 and off to its best start since the 1992-93 season when Stony Brook competed in Division III as the Patriots. The team defeated an SEC opponent (South Carolina) for the first time in program history and has beaten Rhode Island and Atlantic George Washington from the 10 Conference. Women's Basketball is 5-1 after defeating Penn State on Nov. 25. It was the program's first-ever win over а Big Ten team.

Volleyball made history by winning 17 consecutive matches on the way to its second consecutive America East championship and NCAA Tournament appearance. The team faced No. 4 BYU in the first round of the NCAA Tournament on Nov. 30.

Football reached the NCAA FCS Playoffs for the second consecutive year while finishingtheregularseasonrankedNo.15.

Senior football student-athlete Chris Infantino received the prestigious Chuck Boone Leadership and Excellence Award, an honor awarded by the Colonial Athletic Association to the student-athlete who embodies the highest standards of leadership, integrity, teamwork, and sportsmanship in academics and athletics. Chris graduated last May with a double major in biology and psychology and is currently pursuing a Master of Science degree in Biomedical Sciences. He is an ambassador for the Concussion Legacy Foundation and participates in Uplifting Athletes, a fundraising event to raise awareness for rare disease research.

Swimming and Diving defeated LIU Post to claim the first win for the program since the team was reinstated last year following five years of renovations to University Pool. It was also the first victory for Kerry Smith, who came to Stony Brook from Yale, as a head coach.
